



2008 US Lacrosse High School Two-Man Mechanics Test

This copy of the US Lacrosse mechanics test is designed for use by US Lacrosse MDOC officials and Level 2 trainers for reference and education. Please note that only officials entering answers into the online version of the test will have the opportunity to have their participation recognized. Please use this test to prepare for the upcoming season. Good luck!

Online Test Instructions:

Welcome to the US Lacrosse online high school men's lacrosse officiating test based on NFHS rules. For 2008, this test is offered as a free member benefit to all US Lacrosse MDOC officials to help you assess your personal knowledge of current rules before heading into the season. Your participation will be recorded by US Lacrosse.

This is a multiple-choice exam. Select the best answer for each question, keeping in mind that the options given may not cover every single possible outcome (e.g., one of the choices may state that 30 seconds is to be served for a technical foul without pointing out that the penalty would be wiped out if a goal were to be scored during the flag-down situation). Every effort has been made to ensure there is only one correct answer to each question. Be sure to read all of the questions and answers carefully. This test is not timed; however, please make sure that when you do log in to take the test that you complete the entire test so that your score is accurately recorded. If you log out prior to completing the test, your results will be skewed.

The *2008 US Lacrosse Level 1 and 2 Training Manual* should be used as your reference for these questions (or the *US Lacrosse Mechanics Manual* when it becomes available). *Please be aware that many of the questions ask about rules that **differ from** the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Rules.*

After taking the test, you will be given real-time feedback that includes the questions that you answered incorrectly and your original answer. You are encouraged to seek out the correct answer in your rulebook. You may return and take the test as many times as you wish to increase your score and correctly answer all questions. If you are unable to determine the correct answer after going back through your rulebook and taking the test again, feel free to e-mail the Scholastic Officials Committee chair, Harold Buck, at lax.ref@comcast.net for an interpretation and clarification.

Test results will be provided to your District Governor, your District Training Committee Liaison, and your Youth Officials Committee representative periodically for data collection purposes. If your officiating organization requires participation in this test to officiate this season, your district governor will be able to provide this data to your administrator, including your scores from all of the sessions in which you took the test. This test will remain live online until May 1, 2008.

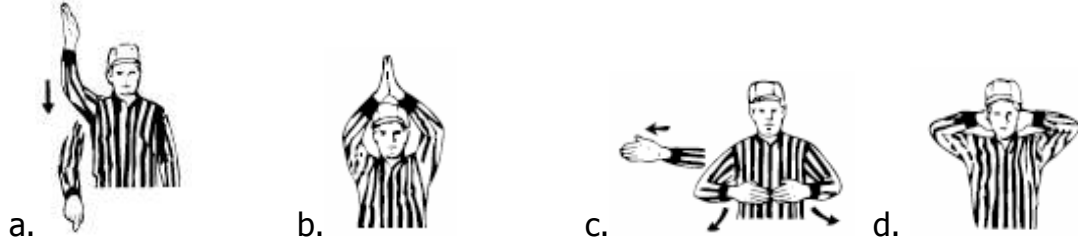

Two-Man Mechanics

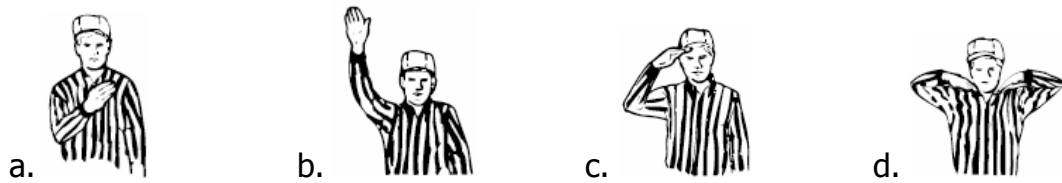
